

Adrian Margaret Smith Piper AM '77, PhD '81

RECIPIENT OF THE 2023 HARVARD ARTS MEDAL

Artist and philosopher Adrian Piper AM '77, PhD '81 has exhibited internationally since 1967, in many media: photo-text collage, drawing, video, sculptural installation, digital imagery, performance and sound. Her contributions to early Conceptual Art led to a the first woman of acknowledged African descent to win the Venice Biennale's Golden Lion for Best Artist, the first American to win the Käthe Kollwitz Prize and the first artist of acknowledged African descent to win the Goslarer Kaiserring.

Piper will be honored in absentia at Harvard University in a public gathering and screening of Piper's film Passing Beyond Passing, April 26 at 7 PM at the Harvard Film Archive.
